


Our 2012 House of the Year—actually three tiny houses—made an outsize impression at New York City's World Financial Center this summer.

Introducing our 2012 House of the Year (A 250-square-foot cottage so nice, we built it thrice)

What would you do if your home magically sprouted an extra room? Better yet, an entirely separate space? Maybe you've dreamed of an office with a 10-second commute. Or guest quarters that let you act the gracious host—without sharing a bathroom. Perhaps your fantasy involves a killer kitchen that takes "cooking out" to exhilarating new heights. To explore the possibilities, we called upon three of our favorite designers, and matched them with "clients": a couple of entrepreneurial artisans, the owner of America's most luxe B&B, and a world-class chef—people with strong opinions about what it takes to make a space really work. 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A Gracious Guest Room

THE GOAL Stand-alone guest quarters that mix the laid-back spirit of summer camp with thoughtful amenities



1. Offer folks a drink. "Guests should be able to enjoy coffee while in their pajamas," says Kreis Beall. The same goes for water. And a bottle of wine certainly wouldn't hurt. Thomas Paul grouped these necessities—plus a jar of Blackberry Farm's granola—atop an antique dresser.

2. Friends don't let friends live out of suitcases. Which is why this cottage provides a wealth of clothing-storage

options, including the dresser, built-in shelves, and a convenient row of hooks.

3. The key to truly original art? A pair of scissors! Paul cut these woodland silhouettes from vintage wallpaper, then pasted them on kraft paper.

4. Bring the tent inside. "A lot of fabric around a canopy bed can seem old-fashioned," Paul concedes. To shake off the mothballs, and support the

room's camp theme, he draped Charles P. Rogers's iron frame with curtains stitched from perfectly plain Sunbrella canvas. Boosting the outdoorsy appeal: the designer's own throw pillows, which reference mallards, wood, and bandannas.

5. Ask more of accessories.


By topping a luggage rack from Ballard Designs with a fleamarket tray, Paul devised a nightstand capable of serving breakfast, too.







Best-Laid Plans: The Guest Cottage



A small bump-out on one of the cottage's long walls helps the tiny house accommodate the bed. For greater flexibility and privacy, vintage doors slide on tracks to cordon off the bathing area from both the main room and the bathroom.

10. Channel practicality. Not only is this Bose TV positioned at the foot of the bed for lazy screening sessions, as Beall requested, but it's wallmounted—no cumbersome media center required.

9. This hamper boasts hidden potential. "In a compact space,

furniture has to do more," Paul says of the laundry bin he found on Etsy. A cushioned lid (Paul covered it to match the shower curtain) allows the

piece to act as extra seating.

The Ultimate Kitchen for Outdoor Entertaining



THE DESIGNER Architect Ruard Veltman, who runs his own firm in Charlotte, North Carolina, is known for working sophisticated wonders with salvage. (ruardveltman architecture.com)

THE GOAL Take backyard cooking to a whole new level with a fully functioning kitchen that's protected from the elements



1. Go with the grain. "I like a kitchen with personality," says Marcus Samuelsson, "rather than some sterile white box." Ruard Veltman introduced character—not clutter—by cladding the walls in reclaimed barn wood from Tall Cotton Supply.

2. Keep it on the down-low. Instead of overwhelming the cottage with cabinetry, Veltman limited himself to lower units, and an island, by Cornell Cabinets & Millwork. And though he sited the Whirlpool cooktop and Porcher farmhouse

sink here—both set into Sile—stone countertops—bulkier appliances find shelter in an alcove (see no. 5, next page). The architect even tucked a dishwasher, also by Whirlpool, into the back side of the island.

3. Preserve the view. Since a typical pendant lamp would block the windows, Veltman crafted an almost invisible fixture of cloth-covered electrical cords, ceramic bases, and filament bulbs. "It's intended to look like its parts," he says. "And that's elegant."

4. Why hide the ingredients you use most? "My spices don't sit in a cabinet—they hang out on the counter," says Samuelsson. These glass containers satisfy his desire to have essentials at hand, in an aesthetically pleasing way.

5. Forget the work triangle.

In a space this tight, it's not like point A is ever that far from point B. So Veltman moved the Whirlpool refrigerator and double ovens off to one side, behind abbreviated walls that lend a sense of separation but refuse to chop up the room.

6. All hail the pocket pantry!

Those abbreviated walls possess a secret: Their back sides stockpile dry and canned goods on shelves that are accessible yet out of sight. Attractive whiteware and wineglasses line the shelves that face the island.




7. That open shelving isn't just for show. "In such narrow confines," Veltman says, "you want as few swinging cabinet doors as possible."

8. Expand your horizons.

Weathered barn doors from Tall Cotton Supply slide wide open and "allow the indoors to merge with the outdoors, so the cook doesn't feel isolated," explains Samuelsson. Veltman further blurred the boundaries with a dining area shaded by an awning of Sunbrella fabric and furnished with a Grandin Road picnic table and benches.



Best-Laid Plans: The Kitchen



Ruard Veltman divided the cottage into three areas, with the heart of the kitchen in the middle. On one side, the walls come out only 28 inches, visually setting off the zone that contains shelves, the fridge, and two ovens. On the other side, there's a powder room with its own separate mudroom entrance—all cleverly hidden from the kitchen by a barn-wood door that disappears into the wall.

A Creative Home Office





THE DESIGNER Though Barbara Kurgan (center) is based in New York City, the interior and furniture designer calls a coastal Maine cottage—featured in our March 2012 issue home. (barbarakurgan.com)

THE EXPERTS Beloved for their Forage line of bow ties, Philadelphians Shauna Alterio and Stephen Loidolt also dream up delightfully oddball objects—handcrafted yo-yos, faux bois chalk—under their Something's Hiding in Here label. (somethingshidinginhere.com)

THE GOAL An artfully organized, thoughtprovoking studio for a husband-and-wife design team who work side by side, all day long

1. How to store material goods in style: "Turn your supplies into decoration," urges Barbara Kurgan, who stashed bolts of fabric in an industrial trash can and skewered swatches on giant safety pins from Ballard Designs.

2. Elevate a standard desk.

Explains Stephen Loidolt: "We prefer counter-height surfaces that encourage us to stand and move around, instead of just sitting and stagnating." Kurgan

fashioned a tall, partnersstyle setup by pairing two Ballard desks and topping them with a custom box that provides a stealthy spot for stowing files and books.

3. Now, this is worth noting! Kurgan attached a roll of kraft paper to the end of the dual workstation, so Loidolt and his wife, Shauna Alterio, can scribble and sketch, then pull a blank sheet over the desktop to start anew.

4. An enlightening path to a clear desk? Ground table-hogging task lights and choose floor lamps, like these Ballard models.

5. Find furniture that plays hide-and-seek. Intended as dining-room servers, these Ballard buys met Kurgan's aim to provide "display opportunities, along with drawers for tucking things away." Mission accomplished. "The stuff that inspires us is out," says Loidolt, "but the office still looks neat."





6. Define a room within a room. Kurgan subtly delineated a sitting area with Company Store's cowhide rug. The Ballard Designs settee, upholstered in coral velvet from Calico Corners, helps cement the workshop's palette, sparked by a box of Ladurée macaroons.

7. A little guirk never hurts.

This vintage print of bow-tie connoisseur Abe Lincoln, from Liza Sherman Antiques, references Alterio and Loidolt's neckwear line. Kurgan also embroidered Ballard's skirted burlap stool with the name of the couple's firm.

8. Climb the walls. Hooks and baskets from Ballard designate a home for jackets, bags, and files, without encroaching upon a bit of floor space.

9. Don't overlook the loo.

Chalkboard paint yields a changeable canvas in the powder room. "Shauna loves wallpaper," Kurgan says, "but rather than settle on a permanent pattern, we had artist Chiara Alberetti Milott draw one."

10. The bulletin board goes


big. Kurgan upholstered an entire wall of the side entry's hallway in Sunbrella fabric, giving Alterio and Loidolt ample space to pin photos, notes, and paint chips.







Best-Laid Plans: The Home Office



The need for a powder room threw the rectangular cottage's symmetry off balance. Barbara Kurgan restored order by establishing a sitting area that mirrors the WC's footprint—a move that let her situate the partners' desk in the true center of the room, beneath the triple windows, where it's flanked by his-and-hers bookcases.
